THE CITY

Melbourne is the capital and largest city of the Australian state of Victoria.

The city is world renowned for its love of sport and vibrant food and coffee culture. Home to indigenous Australians for over 40,000 years and as an early colonial settlement, Melbourne has a rich history and is filled with some of Australia's best-known landmarks.



With hundreds of accommodation options, strong connectivity with destinations across



Oceania, and world class tourist attractions within the city and the surrounding region Melbourne is also a fantastic destination for travelling competitors and families.

In addition to this, Melbourne has a strong history of cubing and a large local cubing community. It held Australia's first ever WCA Competition in 2010 and

was the site of frequent world records set throughout the 2010s thanks to Feliks Zemdegs.

The Melbourne community has continued to grow with larger and more frequent competitions,

with a highlight being the WCA World Championship 2019.

As the home of Oceania's largest community of competitive speedsolvers and with its strong cubing history, Melbourne is the natural host of the first ever WCA Oceanic Championship.




THE VENUE - PARKVILLE STADIUM

Parkville Stadium (Formally known as the State Netball and Hockey Centre) is part of the Melbourne Sports Centres Management Group. The Parkville Stadium is one of Australia's premier sporting venues and has recently undergone an AUD\$64Million renovation. It consists of 4 stadiums.



For the Oceanic Championship we propose utilising two stadiums. It is expected these two stadiums would be capable of hosting 800 competitors plus their guests. We would expect competitor numbers of 600-700.

Main competition area - Parkville Arena (Stadium D)



Parkville Arena is the premier competition space at the Parkville Stadium and offers 1058sqm of floor space and tiered seating for 3000 spectators.

The Parkville Arena will be main competition space with 4 stages of 12 individual stations.



Secondary competition area / Competitor warm-up area (Stadium C)

Parkville Stadium C is a 2397 sqm stadium located adjacent to the Parkville Arena. This stadium will be used for FMC competitions and some side events on Day One and as a competitor warm-up, socialising space on Days Two-Four.





THE SCHEDULE

4 Day Competition

We propose a four-day competition starting Thursday 15th December 2022 and concluding Sunday 18th December.

Day One, Thursday 15th December:

- 4x4x4 & 5x5x5 Blindfolded Final
- 3x3x3 Multi-Blind (2 Attempts)
- 3x3x3 Fewest Moves (3 Attempts)
- Clock R1

Day Two, Friday 16th December:

- Round One for Megaminx, 4x4x4, 5x5x5, 6x6x6, 7x7x7 and Square-1.
- Opening Ceremony

Day Three, Saturday 17th December:

Round One for 3x3x3, 2x2x2, Pyraminx, Skewb, 3x3x3 One-Handed, 3x3x3
 Blindfolded

Day Four, Sunday 18th December:

- Round Two for 3x3x3, 2x2x2, Pyraminx, Skewb, 3x3x3 One-Handed
- Round Three for 3x3x3, 2x2x2
- Final for 2x2x2, 4x4x4, 5x5x5, 6x6x6, 7x7x7, Pyraminx, Skewb, 3x3x3 One-Handed, 3x3x3 Blindfolded, Square-1 and Megaminx.
- Head to head Final for 3x3x3 Cube
